All is Vanity

Ecclesiastes is an intriguing wisdom book. That teacher repeats, "All is Vanity." Vanity is not really the best translation. When I hear the word vanity today, I think of people judging someone for wearing pants instead of a dress. I hear it as something that is outwardly, shallow, and not at all im-



portant. I don't think that is exactly what the scribe is trying to express.

The Hebrew word that is translated usually as vanity is literally translated as vapor or a single breath. The symbolic meaning then is life or the moment is here and then it is gone. He suggests life is just kind of absurd. Money is here and then it's gone. You might see some benefit of your hard work like Proverbs suggests but the benefits don't last. You might realize it didn't mean anything at all. There might be the feeling of bitterness or hopelessness to it. The teacher makes us question the meaning of it all for it is all so fleeting.

What message can we get from a teacher that seems to be so bitter? The teacher speaking reminds us of the importance of living in the present. The teacher is telling us we only have today, so make the most of it while it lasts. This does not mean throw your life away, or waste it doing reckless things. It means don't plan so hard for tomorrow that you aren't living today.

We are reminded that we can always count on God. God doesn't just work in the future or the past. God works in the present so let us share "God's amazing grace" today.

Kaitlyn Ziegelmaier - Leaving in August to participate in ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM)

Kaitlyn has been called to serve as a Young Adult in Global Mission in 2019-2020 in Yeumbeul, Senegal. Yeumbeul is a suburb of Dakar, located not too far from the ocean. She will have the opportunity to engage in many different types of minis-



tries in Yeumbeul as she will be working at the Gall Nanondiral Community Center and Complexe Scholaire Nanondiral, which are ministries of the Senegalese Lutheran Development Services (SLDS).

She will be working with three different programs in the Department of Education: the Preschool and Elementary School, the Library and Education Program at the Community Center and the Sports and leisure program at the community Center. She will be living with a family who is getting ready to welcome her into their home this August.

Part of the requirement to attend this mission trip is to raise \$15,000 for the program. The money will help Kaitlyn and others in the program. This year there are four young adults from the Florida Bahama Synod. Thank you for the donations so far - she is about two-thirds of reaching her goal!
